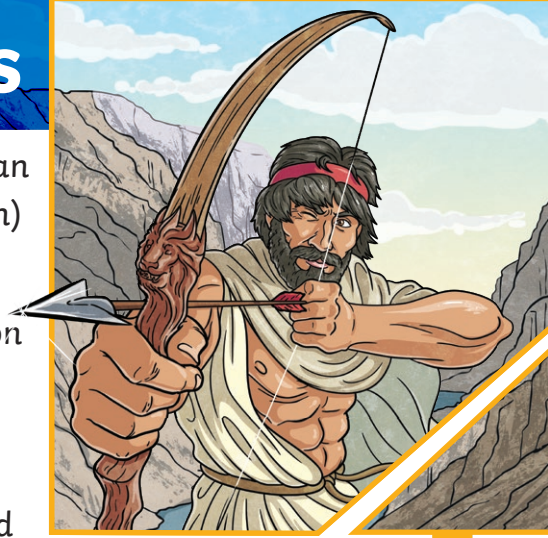


The Labours of Hercules

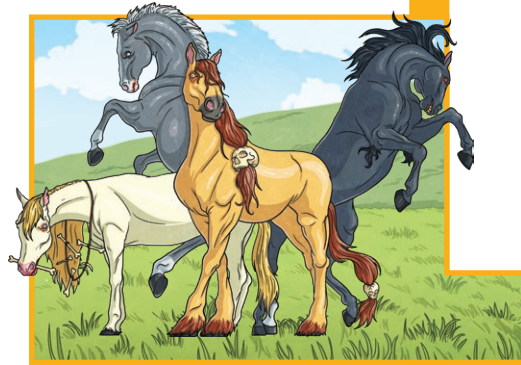
