Area – is the space taken up on the inside of a shape. This is measured in cm^2 .

You can work it out by multiplying the length x width.

(If there is squared paper $1 \text{cm}^2 = 1 \text{ square.}$

Perimeter = the distance around the outside of the shape, you must add up all the sides together.

(If the shape is on squared paper count each square, if it's on a corner count both sides.)
